

NBA Players Have a Union. Why Can't Cablevision Workers?

Today, the Knicks are honoring Martin Luther King, Jr.'s memory, but the Knicks' owners are disrespecting their workers.

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was an outspoken champion of working people. From decrying anti-worker laws to advocating for justice in individual union struggles, Dr. King supported workers. In fact, he was in Memphis supporting striking sanitationmen when he died.

In 2012, all 285 Cablevision workers in Brooklyn—combined—will earn HALF the pay their former number-two executive took home last year. That's just wrong. Yet right now, Cablevision management is fighting workers' right to organize so they can earn fair wages, work in safe conditions, have decent healthcare and a worthwhile retirement plan.

Today, we're calling on Cablevision management and the Dolan family to recognize MLK Day by letting their workers choose whether to form a union without fear of intimidation.

The Cablevision 99%—workers—only want a fair deal. Up to now, the management 1% have denied them.
